



Carol Lue (Glaser) Weaver

December 2, 1949 - September 14, 2025

Carol Lue (Glaser) Weaver passed away on Sunday September 14, 2025. She was born on December 2, 1949, in Adrian, Michigan to Lewis and Carolyn Jane (Maynard) Glaser. Carol's roots in Lenawee County ran deep, residing in Adrian most of her life. On June 6, 1969, she married J. (Joseph) Bruce Weaver. They shared almost 49 years together before his death on April 8, 2018.

Carol Lue earned a Bachelor of Arts in Human Relations at Judson College in Elgin, Illinois in 1975 and a Master of Science in Community Mental Health from Northern Illinois University in Dekalb, Illinois in 1978. Following graduation, she dedicated her life to community service. Carol Lue worked in Elgin, Illinois; Toledo, Ohio; and Adrian, Michigan doing social service administration and providing direct consumer services. Later, she provided mental health therapy in Hillsdale through Jackson-Hillsdale Community Mental Health, and then for Journeys of Michigan. Following retirement, she spent many years doing volunteer driving for Meals on Wheels, and for Lenawee County and the State of Michigan.

She was an active member of several churches including the Community Methodist Church in South Elgin, Illinois; the First Baptist Church, Trenton Hills United Methodist Church, and the First Presbyterian Church in Adrian. Later, she became a dedicated member of the First Presbyterian Church in Tecumseh, Michigan.

Carol Lue had a strong love for her Heavenly Father and worked hard to serve

Him and his children. She felt strongly the call and would answer, "Here I am Lord, I will go Lord, I will hold your people in my heart." She carried this out throughout her life, including serving on mission trips to help with relief efforts for Hurricane Katrina, and to install water filtration systems in rural Nicaragua. She had a deep love for her family and friends and loved many family dogs over the years.

Besides her husband of 48 years, she was preceded in death by her parents, grandparents, her nephew Jack Thomas Glaser, and many aunts and uncles. She is survived by her two sons, Jeffrey L. Weaver (Jamie Weirauch) of Adrian, Michigan and Jason G. Weaver of Coldwater, Michigan; seven grandchildren; three brothers, Nelson (Ann) Glaser, Lewis A. (Debbie) Glaser, and Jeff (Patty) Glaser; numerous cousins and beloved friends; and her two loving dogs, Roxanne and Dottie.

Visitation for Carol will take place on Wednesday, September 17, 2025, from 4 to 7 p.m. at Wagley Funeral Home, Adrian. Funeral services will be held at the funeral home on Thursday, September 18, 2025, at 11 a.m. with Rev.

“When Carol Lue was about 11 years old, she brought a friend to our house who was having some problems at home—she was doing her best to help other people even then. Our Mom was in the attic looking for something and saw Carol Lue and her friend approaching through the window. She overheard Carol say, “You should know, my Mother’s not like other people.” So Mom got a *Morticia Addams* costume out of the Halloween supplies in the attic, put it on, and came downstairs to greet them. I wasn’t there to witness this, but I expect Carol Lue’s response was to dramatically roll her eyes. No one could say our family didn’t have a sense of humor. That was a classic Carol moment.

Just a short year ago my wife Debbie and I had the opportunity to go on an Alaska cruise with Carol Lue. It was a bucket list thing for all of us. And we had the time of our lives!

She was using a walker by then, and it was not easy for her to get around. If you’ve ever been on one of these cruises, it involves a lot of walking. It did not slow her down even a little bit. Debbie and I could hardly keep up with her. We’d be worn out and ready for bed by 8 PM or so. Carol Lue, considering us party poopers, would go to one of the entertainment shows on the ship, and even on evening shore excursions by herself. She was not going to miss a thing.

That’s how she rolled.

And she loved her pets! No dog ever had it so good. An unfortunate consequence of her untimely passing is that she left two, very sweet-natured young dogs behind. They need a caring home. If any of you are dog lovers, please contact me.

Her illness slowly stripped away her ability to throw herself full-tilt into helping others. Her situation shifted to where she had to rely on others for help. This was difficult for someone who had spent her life giving and caring for everyone else. It made her frustrated, sometimes angry and sad. But she held onto her faith. She was at

peace with God and Jesus, and knew where she was going. She told me this many times.

As inevitably happens, we don't live forever.

I adored, loved and sometimes feared my big sister Carol Lue. I am glad to say that she and I had a close and very special relationship. She was 100% supportive, through thick and thin, no matter what. She remains a great inspiration to me. I miss her terribly, and it hurts to say goodbye. But I take comfort in knowing she is in Heaven now, reunited with her loving husband Bruce, our parents and grandparents, and her many pets. I have no doubt she's giving the Heavenly Host a run for their money as we speak.
