



## Joseph W. Pullen

July 7, 1937 - October 12, 2014

Joseph W. Pullen, treasured biology teacher, nature lover and ham radio operator, passed away unexpectedly October 12, 2014, hiking in the forests in Atlanta, Michigan. He was 77 years old.

Born July 7, 1937 in Detroit, Michigan, he was the oldest child of Joseph and Mildred (Fawcett) Pullen. Joe graduated from Adrian High School in 1955 and earned a Bachelor's Degree from Adrian College. He earned a Master's Degree in Biology from University of Michigan.

Joe was a faithful member of St. Rita Catholic Church.

Students of Joe remember his passion for teaching biology in the classroom setting as well as during summer field biology classes and the numerous Quetico and Boundary Water canoe wilderness camping trips he led for the YMCA. For over 40 years Joe hiked a portion of the Appalachian Trail each spring. He retired from Adrian Public Schools in 1989, having taught for 25 years. Joe remained active at the high school as an announcer for swim meets and taking tickets for various events.

A multi-faceted man, Joe's interest in being a ham radio operator grew into a volunteer position as the Amateur Radio Coordinator for Lenawee County, organizing weather spotter volunteers and serving as a liaison with the State. Joe was a member of the Coast Guard Auxiliary and also worked as an agent for The Taylor Agency. Joe loved his dog, Gypsy.

Joe is survived by his sister, Phyllis (William) Garno of Clayton; niece, Christine (Mike) Tabor and nephew, Andrew Garno, both of North Carolina;

and countless friends within the community.

Funeral services will be held at 11:00 a.m. on Thursday, October 16, 2014, at Wagley Funeral Home with Fr. Thomas Helfrich officiating. Burial will follow at Lenawee Hills Memorial Park. Visitation will take place at the funeral home on Wednesday from 4:00 to 7:00 p.m.
