Virginia Louise Wyatt, 94 years of age passed away on May 3, 2014 at her home in Detroit, Michigan. Mrs. Wyatt had been in declining health. Virginia was the only child of Jacob C. and Roselea Dykema. She was born in East Grand Rapids Michigan, March 19, 1920. Mrs. Wyatt earned a Bachelor of Science Degree in Pharmacy from the University of Grand Rapids.

On May 6, 1944 Virginia married Roger E. Wyatt Jr. of Adrian, Michigan. They were married in New York City at the Church of Transfiguration known to New Yorkers as The Little Church Around the Corner.

When Mr. Wyatt was discharged from the United States Maritime Service he and Virginia returned to Adrian, Michigan where they managed H.F. Wyatt and Company and raised their daughter.

Mrs. Wyatt was a member of the Kappa Kappa Epsilon Sorority, a group whose charitable and social events she enjoyed very much.

Mrs. Wyatt was preceded in death by her parents, Jacob and Rosalea and her husband, Roger. She is survived by her daughter Linda (John) Brennan, grandchildren, Dr. Michael (Kate) Brennan, Katherine (Andy) Lee and great grandchildren, Luke Brennan, Jane Brennan, and Clare Lee. She is also survived by her niece Susan Carlin McElfresh and her son Randy McElfresh.

Mrs. Wyatt has been cremated and there will be a Memorial Service at the Wagley Funeral Home in Adrian on Saturday, May 31, 2014 at 11:00 am followed by a private family burial service at Fairfield Cemetery.

Of course, I was thrilled to be able to talk with both of them at a professional level, especially Mrs. Wyatt because I had admired her as a professional woman.
